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Need and Recommendation 4. Commercial and industrial clean-up of junk, debris, and inoperable vehicles. (Non Eligible)

The following commercial and industrial sites on Rome Avenue between Kennedy Boulevard and Cypress Street need aesthetic clean-up:

- a. Kentucky Fried Chicken (Rome Avenue and Kennedy Boulevard)
- b. Tampa Housing Authority (Rome Avenue and Kennedy Boulevard)
- c. Bay Plastering, Bay Masonry of Tampa (306 N. Rome Avenue), (Alleyway, right-of-way, Construction yard overgrowth of weeds and debris)
- d. Global Machine (110-A Rome Avenue), (right-of-way around the building)
- e. Jensen Cabinetry (310 N. Rome Avenue), (right-of-way overgrowth)
